  - United States of America

may be considered to have met the English language skills registration standard. For graduates from programs of study approved by the Board (as published at the Board's website at <u>www.nursingmidwiferyboard.gov.au</u> under *Accreditation: Approved programs of study*), it is a requirement that the head of school confirms to the Board that the applicant is safe to practise nursing and/or midwifery in a clinical setting, using the English language.

My concern is in the highlighted area. What does the Board mean by MAY BE CONSIDERED and how is this assessed. I would like to see some openness in how this will be evaluated and managed. Apart from that the rest appears OK
