Registered nurses with a sole qualification in mental health nursing, paediatric nursing or disability nursing

Introduction

The Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia (NMBA) undertakes functions as set by the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law, as in force in each state and territory (the National Law). The NMBA regulates the practice of nursing and midwifery in Australia, and one of its key roles is to protect the public. The NMBA does this by developing registration standards, professional codes, guidelines and standards for practice which together establish the requirements for the professional and safe practice of nurses and midwives in Australia.

This following information is applicable for registered nurses with a sole qualification in mental health, paediatric nursing or disability nursing.

Background

Before the commencement of the National Registration and Accreditation Scheme (the National Scheme), each state and territory used a different approach for the registration of nurses with a sole qualification in mental health nursing, paediatric nursing or disability nursing. As a result, registrants with a sole qualification in one of these three areas of nursing, transitioned differently into the National Scheme leading to variations in how registrant details were displayed on the [national register](#).

In 2012, the NMBA introduced changes to notations to ensure that registered nurses with similar qualifications and expertise in mental health nursing, paediatric nursing or disability nursing hold the same registration type for consistency but the scope of their foundational education is clearly highlighted.

How are registered nurses with a sole qualification in mental health, paediatric or disability nursing registered?

Registered nurses (RN) who have a sole qualification in mental health, disability or paediatric nursing do not have a qualification that is substantially equivalent to an NMBA approved qualification leading to registration as a registered nurse. Depending on their area of practice, RNs with one of these qualifications are registered with a notation stating that they are:

- *'solely qualified in the area of mental health nursing'*, or
- *'solely qualified in the area of paediatric nursing'*, or
- *'solely qualified in the area of disability nursing'*.

Qualifications solely in mental health, paediatric or disability nursing can only be obtained internationally, as there are no programs of study approved in Australia for nurses to gain these types of qualifications.

What does the notation mean?

Notations are used by National Boards to describe and explain the scope of a practitioner's practice by noting the limitations on practice. In this situation the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia use the notation to indicate limitations of the practitioner's foundational education and therefore on their practice.

Will a notation reflect badly on my professional status?

No, a notation is not an indication of any concern about your performance or ability as an RN. Notations are used to provide relevant information to employers and the public on an individual's registration status, in these circumstances the area in which they are qualified.

I hold a sole qualification but wish to work in a different area of practice – what do I need to do?

If you hold general registration with a sole qualification notation, you will first need to complete an NMBA approved program of study leading to general registration as a registered nurse. Additionally, you will need to ensure that you have the appropriate education and experience to work in a different area of practice.

The NMBA expects that nurses and midwives recognise and work within their scope of practice which is determined by their education, training, authorisation, competence, qualifications and experience, in accordance with local policy¹.

How can I have the notation removed from my registration?

If you hold general registration with a sole qualification notation, you will first need to complete an NMBA approved program of study leading to general registration as a registered nurse and apply to the NMBA to have the notation removed.

I hold a sole qualification but wish to work in a different area of practice – what do I need to do?

If you hold general registration with a sole qualification notation, you will first need to complete an NMBA-approved program of study leading to general registration. Additionally, you will need to ensure that you have the appropriate education and experience to work in a different area of practice.

The NMBA's [decision making framework](#) and [standards for practice](#) provide guidance to nurses when making decisions about scope of practice and responsibilities. In order to minimise risk when you are working, it is essential that you work within the scope and standards of practice relevant to the role you are working in

How can I have the notation removed from my registration?

If you hold general registration with a sole qualification notation, you will first need to complete an NMBA-approved program of study leading to general registration. Additionally you will need complete an [Application for removal of notation form APRN-40](#).
